

Brothers live, pray, and work alongside others, often serving in the social service field, special needs facilities, hospitals, homeless shelters, or wherever needed.

A brother's life is shaped by a rhythm of prayer, work, and community living. Early mornings start with communal prayer and Mass, followed by breakfast and a service-filled day. Every brother brings his own talents to the table, making the community rich and vibrant.


Walking in the Footsteps of St. John of God





Remembering Pope Francis



Pope Francis, born Jorge Mario Bergoglio on December 17, 1936, in Buenos Aires, Argentina, became the 266th Pope of the Roman Catholic Church in March 2013. As the first pope from the Americas and the Southern Hemisphere, his papacy marked a significant shift in the Church's history. Known for his humility, compassion, and dedication to social justice, Pope Francis endeared himself to millions worldwide.

Mission Moment

A gentleman experiencing homelessness was recently admitted to Kendall Regional Hospital, Miami, Florida, for psychiatric care. Upon discharge, he was provided with transportation to Camillus Health Concern (CHC), Miami, Florida, for assistance with housing services. When he arrived, he shared with the CHC team that he had been directed there for overnight shelter and housing support.

He was welcomed into the walk-in clinic, where an initial assessment revealed a need for both medical and behavioral health care. It was immediately clear to all teams involved that he could not be safely discharged to the streets and required emergency shelter.

Thanks to the compassionate collaboration of CHC's case managers, Brother Sean, and the Lazarus Project Team, he was successfully connected to housing support.

He continues to return to CHC for the care and support he needs.

Brother Gerard Sullivan, OH *July 20, 1945 – December 2, 2024*

Brother Gerard entered religious life September 15, 1969, in Albuquerque, New Mexico. He professed first vows February 23, 1971, in Waterford, Ireland and final vows February 1, 1976, in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Over the years, he served at Good Shepherd Centre, Wolverhampton, England; Good Shepherd Manor, Kansas City, Missouri; Good Shepherd Center, Albuquerque, New Mexico; Good Shepherd Center, Alameda, New Mexico; Barrett House, Toronto, Ontario; Cardinal Manning House of Prayer, Los Angeles, California; Camillus House, Miami, Florida and Good Shepherd Manor, Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Brother Gerard was the Director of Novices for many years at the House of Formation in Toronto, Ontario; and served on the General Council for more than 25 years.

His Funeral Mass and internment of ashes were at Villa Mathias, Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Hospitaller Leadership

On November 1, 2024, in Czestochowa, Poland, Brother Pascal Ahodegnon was elected Superior General of the Hospitaller Order of St. John of God during the 70th General Chapter.

Brother Pascal was born in Savè, Benin on April 10, 1971. He entered the Order in 1994, took his temporary vows on August 15, 1997, and made final vows on May 25, 2003. He graduated in medicine and surgery in Milan, Italy. He was elected General Councilor in 2012, and re-elected in 2019, particularly in charge of the Africa region.

Brother Pascal's General Council consists of Brother Joaquim Erra Mas, Vicar and First General Councilor; Brother Jaki Mullankuzhy, Second General Councilor; Brother Etienne Mbad Sene, Third General Councilor; Brother David Lynch, Fourth General Councilor; and Brother John Jung, Fifth General Councilor.


Silver Jubilee
